Greensboro Receives Free Neighborhood Design Consultation

The City is one of eight communities nationwide to receive a free neighborhood design consultation from Global Green USA. Over the next several months, sustainability experts will visit Greensboro and provide comprehensive recommendations for infrastructure and policy changes to ensure a more resource-efficient, livable, healthy, and environmentally responsible neighborhood.

Greensboro applied for this grant for the Cottage Grove area that encompasses the S. English Street corridor and includes a section of the Willow Oaks redevelopment area and Hampton Elementary University Partnership Magnet.

Stay Safe this Winter



Severe winter weather can strike quickly, so always be prepared. The City's Emergency Management Office suggests you have a disaster supply kit ready, prepare your home and family for the possibility of losing heat or water during a winter storm, make sure your car is ready to roll by keeping it well maintained, and dress appropriately for the cold. Emergency Management officials also warn that electric space heaters can be hazardous and should be used with extreme caution to prevent shock, fire and burns. Follow the usage instructions carefully. And, never use gas ovens and burners to heat your home. If your heat does not work or you have no heat, contact your building's owner.

Lake Higgins Hatchery Pond is Restocked

The Taylor Turner Hatchery Pond at Lake Higgins has been restocked with trout for public fishing. Anglers 16 years and older must have a valid North Carolina fishing license, but a trout stamp is not required. The fee is \$1 to fish and \$3.75 per pound of fish caught. All fish caught must be weighed and kept. This is not a catch and release fishing opportunity. Lake Higgins Watershed Park is located at 4235 Hamburg Mill Rd., off Highway 220 North.
