Put Safety First in Honor of Bike Month

May is National Bike Month and in recognition of it, the City reminds riders how to keep themselves and others safe. Since bicycles are defined by state law as vehicles, bicyclists should behave like drivers by:

• Riding with traffic, not against it

• Stopping at all stop

signs and red lights

- Signaling their intentions
- Not passing on the right unless in a bike lane or shoulder
- Using lights when riding at night
- Riding as far to the right as possible, while avoiding hazards like potholes and parked cars.

Also, under state law, all bicyclists under age 16 must wear a helmet and it is recommended that all riders wear one.

Motorists should:

- Look for bicyclists before turning and opening car doors
- Not drive or park in bike lines
- Not pass a bicyclist when making a right turn. Instead, they should slow down, merge and then turn.

City Offers Yard Waste Tips

With spring now here, many of us are out doing yard work. The City collects yard waste every week on your regular garbage collection day. To ensure collection, can it, bag it or bundle it.

Use your own 32-gallon trash can for yard waste. Your can should have handles and a lid. Irregularly shaped containers may not be serviced. Filled cans should weigh no more than 50 pounds. If you were to place a lid on the can, all materials should be contained inside. Long branches protruding from the container may result in service denial.

Use only heavy duty clear plastic bags for your yard waste. Using black plastic bags, paper bags, and green recycling bags will result in non-collection. Filled bags must weigh less than 50 pounds.

Tie yard waste in bundles not more than five feet long and no heavier than 50 pounds.

GPAC Task Force Continues to Gather Input

The Greensboro Performing Arts Center (GPAC) Task Force has visited the Durham Performing Arts Center (DPAC) and the Schuster Center in Dayton, Ohio, to help determine which type of facility might best fit Greensboro.

Most of DPAC's performances are for touring Broadway productions. The facility is owned by the city of Durham, but privately operated by a management company. Schuster hosts mostly ballet, opera and philharmonic performances. Public and private donations funded construction of the facility, but it is owned and operated by a nonprofit.
