Can Greensboro Count on You?

Have you completed and returned your Census 2010 form? If not, come on and get counted. The number of people counted determines how much federal money Greensboro gets for healthcare, housing, roads, schools, social services, job training, and other services. It also determines where district lines are drawn for political



elections and the number of representatives our state gets in Congress.

With only 10 questions, the 2010 Census form takes only 10 minutes to complete. Households are asked to provide key demographic information, including whether a housing unit is rented or owned, the address of the residence, and the names, genders, ages, and races of people living in the household. Your citizenship is not asked.

All your answers are private and confidential. No court of law, welfare or immigration agency can see what you say.

April is Fair Housing Month



Since April is Fair Housing Month, the City wants to make sure that you know your housing rights. Under the City's Fair Housing Ordinance it is against the law for you to be discriminated against in housing based on race, color, gender, religion, national origin, disability, or family status.

It is also illegal for anyone to be discriminated against in any public or private residential real estate transaction including buying, selling, renting,

financing, and advertising.

Unfortunately cases of housing discrimination still occur, but the City's Human Relations Department serves as the enforcer of the ordinance and works with individuals to resolve cases when they occur.

New Business Search Feature


In an effort to support the economic growth of Greensboro's business community, the City of Greensboro is now making it easier to look up businesses with a new privilege licensees search feature on its Web site at greensboro-nc.gov/businesses/privilegelookup.htm. You can now search for a business by its name or its owner's name and by type.

To be included on this database, business owners must purchase a business privilege license and renew it annually. Being included on the list is optional.

Participate in Pier Big Fish Contest
