Now Open: Six Glass-Only Drop-off Locations & Overflow Recycling Drop-off Sites

Glass bottles and jars are no longer accepted in the City's residential recycling program, but there are now six glass-only drop-off locations you can use. Visit www.greensboronc.gov/GlassDropOff for all the details.

And if you have too much recycling for your regular residential containers, you can now drop off your overflow at the White Street Landfill and Solid Waste Transfer Station. The service is free for Greensboro residents; \$10 for non-residents. Questions? Visit www.greensboro-nc.gov/ RecyclingDropOff.

Lead-Based Paint Grant Funding Available

Are there children under six living in or frequently visiting your home or rental unit? Was your dwelling built before 1978? If so, apply for lead-based paint hazard reduction assistance.

The Neighborhood Development Department's Lead-Safe Housing Program has grant funding up to \$30,000 for contracted construction work such as replacing windows and doors and wrapping exterior trim at these dwellings. If other health

hazards exist, the City may offer up to \$5,000 more to correct the issues.

Also, sign up to receive the City's website e-mail notifications whenever new census information is posted. Fill out your contact information on our e-Notify page - www.greensboro-nc.gov/e-notify - and select "Census" in the Calendar section and the News section of that page.

Remember: Accurate census counts affect how much federal funding the city gets for various programs for the next 10 years. NC could lose about \$1,600 in funding per year for each resident not counted. Every body

Know Your Flood Hazard

Greensboro has several major streams that sometimes flood during and after heavy rainstorms. These floodwaters can be hazardous to your home and safety if you are not prepared.

Water Resources Department staff suggest the following:

~ Find out if you live in a flood zone by either calling Water Resources at 336-373-2055 or visiting www.greensboro-nc.gov/Flooding and clicking on the "Flood Risk Map" link. Here you will find info about the City's Flood Insurance Rate Map, elevation certificates, flood depth data, flood insurance, historical flood information, special rules for building in a floodplain, and ways to protect your property.

~ Purchase flood insurance. Standard homeowner insurance policies usually do not cover flood damage. Visit www.floodsmart.gov for more information.

If flooding is a possibility in your area, prepare in advance by elevating electrical panels, air conditioners, heat pumps, furnaces, fuel tanks, and water heaters at least 12 inches above the base flood elevation or projected flood heights.


If floodwaters start to rise, evacuate to higher ground. If there is time, turn off all utilities before leaving your home or work area. And, never attempt to drive through a

flooded area; turn around, don't drown.

Never dump anything down a storm drain. Storm drains carry untreated water directly to streams and lakes. This polluted water then impacts aquatic wildlife.

Before you build or repair in a special flood hazard area, call Water Resources at 336-373-2005 for special rules involved in this work. You may need to obtain a permit from the City's inspections division before beginning the job.
