


About Dudley Heights



School. Most of its original residents still remain in the neighborhood. There are 300+ houses in the neighborhood. Reportedly, some of the homes were built by African American contractors, Charles and Curtis Ruffin. The community has a history of promoting unity, fellowship, and a positive empowered community spirit, dating back to the winter of 1961 when the Dudley Heights Community Club was formed. Residents are blue collar workers, law enforcement, building contractors, educators, administrators, along with other professionals and government workers. Recent years have brought some changes to the community, including an increase in rental properties along with a younger and more diverse population.
