Residents Elect New Council

Greensboro voters elected a new City Council on November 5. Nancy Vaughan was elected mayor, while Sharon Hightower (District 1), Jamal Fox (District 2) and Tony Wilkins (District 5) were elected for the first time; Wilkins had been appointed to the vacant seat in 2012.

Meanwhile, incumbent Council members Marikay Abuzuaiter and Yvonne Johnson (At-Large), Zack Matheny (District 3) and Nancy Hoffmann (District 4) were reelected. Mike Barber, a former Councilmember, was elected for an At-Large seat.

Loose Leaf Program Underway



The City's annual Loose Leaf Collection program is underway. Leaves that were curbside by November 13 will be picked up by December 21 and leaves curbside by December 26 will be picked up by January 26.

The City's Water Resources
Department reminds you to properly
dispose of your holiday cooking fats,
oils and greases. Build up of these
materials in your house's pipes can
lead to raw sewage overflowing
into your home or from a nearby
manhole. Follow these tips:

~ Never pour grease down the kitchen sink, garbage disposal or

~ Remove food and grease from all cookware before washing or disposing in trash can

~ Place used cooling oils in a container and place in trash can. Learn more at www.greensboro-nc. gov/Fats.


Stay Posted on Trash/Recycling Collections

Visit www.greensboro-nc.gov/ TrashSchedule to stay posted on when the City collects trash and recycling during holiday weeks and follow these rules of thumb:

- When a holiday falls on a Monday, both Monday and Tuesday collections occur one day later.
- When a holiday falls on Tuesday, Tuesday collection occurs one day later.
- When a holiday falls on Wednesday, there is no change in collection services.
- When a holiday falls on a Thursday, Thursday collection occurs one day earlier.
- When a holiday falls on Friday, both Thursday and Friday collections occur one day earlier.
