The City's second annual Summer Night Lights (SNL) program for teens is underway. SNL provides



Guilford County youth ages 13-18 more than 120 free events in safe environments to help deter juvenile crime during the summer months. Weekly programs such as basketball, pool parties, movies, gaming competitions, and dances will be held through August at locations such as the Greensboro Sportsplex, City recreation centers, City outdoor pools, and the Cultural Center.

A new animal ordinance prohibiting unattended tethering/chaining of dogs in Guilford County is now in effect. Residents have until March 2015 to comply with the ordinance,

which was adopted to reduce animal cruelty cases, reported dog bites, and unwanted
