

#### **Black History Month Events**

The Greensboro Public Library and Greensboro Historical Museum are hosting Black History Month events for all ages throughout the month of February. #### **March Council Meetings**

Greensboro City Council meets on Tuesdays, March 1 and 15, at 5:30 pm in the Council Chamber of the Melvin Municipal Office Building, 300 W. Washington St. Meetings are open to the public and aired live on Channel 13 and online at greensboronc.gov. Parking is available in the Greene Street Parking Deck.

#### **Water Rate Reduction**

City Council has approved an additional 3 percent reduction in water rates for City residents. This comes as an addition to the 3 percent reduction that went into effect January 1. The new reduction will be applied beginning February 1.

#### **Greensboro Police Win Award**

The Greensboro Police Department (GPD) has been selected as a National Award winner by the National Association of Town Watch (NATW) for its participation in 2010's National Night Out (NNO) crime, drug and violence prevention program.

Award recipients are selected based on the area's participation and a post-event report detailing what has been done to positively alter crime that year. GPD's report detailed SCORE efforts by each of its Community Resource Team squads and other City department partners. For this year's NNO, GPD registered more than 100 communities as participants.

## City Swings into Action for Youth **Sports**

Have you often wondered what to do with used sports equipment once your kids have stopped playing, or outgrown their gear? A new organization, created in partnership with the Greensboro Police Department (GPD), Greensboro Parks and Recreation

equipment off your hands.



Tyler's Locker is a nonprofit that benefits the underserved youth of the Greensboro Community. The nonprofit solicits and provides sports equipment and participation opportunities to Greensboro youth who otherwise would not have the means to participate in organized sports programs.

Through the program, new and used sports equipment is collected and distribution to youth who have demonstrated a desire to participate in a Greensboro Parks and Recreation organized sports program, but lack the funding and equipment. With former Carolina Panther Ricky Proehl as the charity's spokesperson and Omega Sports as a corporate sponsor, all collected sports equipment and monetary gifts are forwarded to the Parks and Recreation Department for inventory, while the GPD aids in the collection and distribution process. To donate to the program, visit Omega Sports, 2431 Battleground Ave., and drop off any new or used sports equipment or make a monetary donation.

### NeighborWoods Grant Program

The City of Greensboro is now accepting applications for its 2011 NeighborWoods Grant. The program provides trees to Greensboro neighborhoods to help replace those that have been damaged or lost.

The NeighborWoods Grant - a partnership between the City of Greensboro, Greensboro Beautiful Inc. and the NC Cooperative Extension Service - provides up to 150 trees and mulch for

one neighborhood each year. NeighborWoods representatives also work with residents to educate and assist them in the planting and maintenance of the trees.



Registration Now Open for City Sporting Events

The City's Parks and Recreation Department is now accepting applications for adult women's softball and the 2011 Greater Greensboro Senior Games and SilverArts competition.

The women's softball league is open to adults, at least 18 years old. Team registration is \$475 for teams

inside Guilford County and \$845 for teams outside of the county. Deadline for registration is March 1. Individuals interested in participating should contact Paula Boykin at 373-2946.

Each year, more than 200 seniors (age 55 and older) compete in a variety of sporting events and exhibit their artwork in a number of fine arts categories in the senior games and silverarts competition. # Website Photo Contest



# Latest Statistics Show Crime Reduction

According to annual crime statistics compiled by the Greensboro Police Department, violent crime in the City is down 24 percent, while property crime has decreased by 9 percent compared to the same months measured in 2009. In addition, the police department's clearance rate - or the measure of crimes solved by the department - continues to exceed the national average as the aggravated assault rate is 75 percent, while larceny is 48 percent.



Police Chief Ken Miller says many strategies have led to crime reduction, including an increase in police staffing, crime hot spot targeting and improved communications with City residents.

### City Outreach Events on the Horizon

Feedback from Greensboro residents is extremely important to City Council and management. That's why the City is preparing its new slate of spring outreach events, designed to bring representatives from the City to the residents to discuss important topics like the City budget and neighborhood issues.
