

Loose Leaf Collection

Picking up leaves can be a chore, but the City's annual Loose Leaf Collection Program, which runs from November 1 through January 22, 2011, makes it easy. All you have to do is rake your leaves to the curb and the City will do the rest.

The program offers two collection periods:

- Leaves that are curbside by November 1 will be picked up by December 11.
- Leaves that are curbside by December 13 will be picked up by January 22.

Changes to the schedule, caused by inclement weather, will be posted at greensboro-nc.gov and on Channel 13. For more information, call 336-373-CITY(2489).

Thanksgiving trash/recycling

City of Greensboro offices, buildings and facilities will be closed Thursday, November 25, and Friday, November 26, in observation of Thanksgiving. No garbage, recycling, bulk trash, yard waste, and appliance collections take place on Thanksgiving Day—Thursday, November 25. Thursday's collections take place Wednesday, November 24. Friday's collections remain the same.

Greensboro's 'cold cases'

The Greensboro Police Department continues to try to solve old cases, called "cold cases." Each month on its Web page -- greensboro-nc.gov/ departments/Police/coldcases -- previously unsolved cases like the one below are randomly highlighted. The police ask for information and assistance in apprehending those re-

sponsible for these crimes.

William Ransom Hobbs Jr. 56. was killed September 13, 2008 at 519 Summit Ave. in an apparent intentionally set fire. The house at 519 Summit was also known as "The Castle." Hobbs was a local



musician well known for Americana and blues music. Anyone with information on this case is asked to call Crime Stoppers at 336-373-1000. There is a reward of up to \$2,000 for information leading to the arrest of the person(s) responsible for William's death. The Governor's office has also extended an additional reward of up to \$5,000 for information leading to the offender's arrest and conviction.

Holiday Safety Reminders

With the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays on the horizon, the Greensboro Police Department reminds you to be diligent to protect your home and yourself during travel and shopping excursions.

If you plan to travel during the holidays, here are some reminders for what to do to ensure



your home is protected while you're away:

- Get an automatic timer for your lights.
- Ask a neighbor to watch your home.
- Don't forget to have mail and newspaper delivery stopped.
- Mark your home valuables with your NC driver's license
- Keep the house locked and blinds in their normal position.

Don't forget to put these safety tips into practice while doing you're holiday shopping:

- Try not to shop alone, especially at night.
- Don't carry large sums of money and don't display it.
- Be sure your car is in good working condition and keep plenty of gas in the tank.
- Be sure to alert a friend or family member to where you're going and when you'll be back.
- Park in well-lit areas that are as close entrances as possi-
- Put all packages in the trunk, not on the floor or seats.
- Keep purses and bags closed, securely under your arm and off counters, out of shopping carts, and away from children.

Police Department Awarded \$4.6 Million Grant

The Greensboro Police Department has been awarded a \$4.6 million grant to pay salaries for 30 officers for three years. This grant allows the City to begin to recruit classes of new officers well in advance of vacancies being realized, so it can keep its rosters as full as possible without raising the City's sworn allocations. With the grant, the City will be able to deploy officers more proactively and concentrate on key crime problems.
