# **Assistant City Manager Selected**

Andy Scott was recently appointed assistant city manager for Economic Development for the City of Greensboro. The selection of Scott concludes an extensive recruiting and interviewing process.

Scott, who served as interim assistant city manager for Economic Development since March of 2009, will oversee the City's economic development activities, provide support services to Greensboro businesses and serve as a liaison between City government and the business community.



"Andy has an extensive career and proven track record with community and economic development," said Greensboro City Manager Rashad Young. "The city will be well-served to have him in this role overseeing the important effort to strengthen the economic growth of our community."

Before being named assistant city manager, Scott served as the City's director of Housing and Community Development for more than a decade. Scott's salary will be \$121,000.

The vacancy created by Scott's promotion will not be filled at this time. Dan Curry will continue to serve as acting director of Housing and Community Development, a role he's held since March 2009.

Guilford Metro 9-1-1 (GM 9-1-1) was recently awarded accreditation as an Emergency Fire Dispatch Center of Excellence from the International Academies of Emergency Dispatch (IAED). IAED is an international non-profit standard-setting organization that promotes safe and effective emergency dispatch services world-wide.

GM 9-1-1 is the 11th 9-1-1 center in the nation, out of 6,500, and the 12th in the world to be awarded this distinction for its comprehensive implementation and compliance with the Fire Priority Dispatch System (FPDS). The FPDS is a comprehensive emergency fire dispatch system de-

signed to provide responder and caller safety, maximize utilization of resources, prioritize responses, provide efficient delivery of pre-arrival instructions, and improve overall customer service.

#### **Police Release Preliminary Crime Stats**

The Greensboro Police Department's preliminary crime statistics for 2009 show violent crime decreased by 4 percent and property crime declined by 3 percent compared to 2008. Homicides also declined by 28 percent for the year.

A final version of the annual statistics for 2009 will be released within the next two months.

Also, construction of the new McGirt-Horton Library is well underway. The 10,000 square foot facility will be located at the corner of Phillips and Woodbriar avenues. The building is expected to

# **New State Laws Aim to Keep Families Safe**

A new state law is now in effect that requires contractors working on housing built prior to 1978 or any child-occupied facility to be certified by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as a certified renovator and follow lead-safe work practices.

Under the new law, contractors performing work that disturbs any painted surface, over six square feet on the interior or 20 square feet on the exterior, must take precautions to prevent lead contamination, such as properly disposing of lead debris.

Also, carbon monoxide detectors are now required in rental properties that use fossil fuel appliances or fossil fuel fired heating systems. And, they will be required in new homes beginning January 1, 2011.
