Music Center Mosaic Concert



Benjamin Library Reopens



After closing for renovation more than a year ago, the Benjamin Branch Library reopens January 7. The newly renovated facility features an updated and refreshed collection of books, periodicals and videos, as well as additional computer stations. It also features separate areas dedicated to teens and children and a redesigned, more inviting meeting room with views to the outside. In addition to these enhancements, public art will be on display inside the library.

These upgrades were made possible by a 2006 voter-approved library facilities bond.

Heating Safety Tips

With cold weather upon us, many residents have begun using space heaters and other heating devices to help keep their homes warm. While heaters can be a good way to warm up your home, they can also be dangerous if not used properly. According to the National Fire Protection Association, in 2006 heating equipment was the cause of an estimated 64,100 reported home fires, 540 deaths, 1,400 injuries and \$943 million in property damage. Also, heaters are the leading cause of home fires during the months of December, January and February, and trails only cooking equipment in home fires year-round.

So before you plug your heater up, take the following precautions:

- Pull furniture and other combustible items at least three feet away from any heater.
 - Heaters should only be used for a limited amount of time each day.

Exotic Snakes Make Greensboro Home

Bur-Mil Park has added a new snake exhibit at the Frank Sharp Jr. Wildlife Education Center, 5834 Bur-Mil Club Rd. The two-level display features a Ball Python and Rainbow Boa Constrictor. The habitat closely simulates the natural environment of snakes with special attention given to factors such as proper temperature and humidity.

Heating Safety Tips (cont...)

- Never run a heater's cord under rugs or carpet.
- Don't place heaters in high-traffic areas of your home.
- Don't place anything on top of your heater.
- To prevent electrical shocks and electrocutions, keep portable heaters away from water and never touch one if you're wet.
- If you're using a kerosene heater, only use crystal clear K-1 kerosene— never gasoline or camp stove fuel.

Along with fire, another potential danger of heating devices is carbon monoxide poisoning. If you have any appliances or equipment that burn propane, natural gas, kerosene, wood, etc., you should install a carbon monoxide detector.

And as always, remember to place at least one smoke detector on each level of your home. The Greensboro Fire Department will provide smoke detectors and/or replacement batteries free to any resident in the city. If you are in need of one, call 336-547-4088.

City Makes Disposing Christmas

Trees Easy

Now that the holidays are over, you may be wondering what to do with your Christmas tree. No need to worry, the City has you covered. Christmas trees are collected on your regular trash collection day. Be sure to remove all decorations and place your tree at



the curb by 7 am. Trees that are over five feet tall should be cut in half or into manageable segments. Trees may also be disposed of at the White Street Landfill, located at 2503 White St.

Also, please note that wrapping paper is not recyclable. However, it is reusable, as are ribbons, bows, tissue paper and gift bags. Neatly fold them, store them with your other Christmas items and reuse them next Christmas.

- ~ Beginning January 1, carbon monoxide detectors will be required in all existing rental units and new homes. They will also be required in existing homes that are being upgraded and renovated. For more information, call the City's Engineering & Inspections Department at 336-373-2155.
- ~ Every 10 years, the US Census Bureau counts everyone residing in the United States. The next census will take place in April and the City wants everyone in Greensboro to be counted. - ~ The City's annual Loose Leaf Collection Program wraps up January 22. If you missed out, remember that the City offers year-round leaf pick-up.
