New City Manager Takes Helm

The City of Greensboro's new City Manager, Rashad Young, is now on board. Young assumed his duties on October 16. As City Manager, Young serves as the chief executive officer of the City, charged with providing administrative leadership to staff, carrying out the policies, programs, ordinances and resolutions approved by City Council and overseeing all City operations.

"I am extremely excited about being a part of the City of Greensboro," said Young. "This is a great city with a bright future and I look forward to working with the community to make Greensboro a better place to work, live and play."



As he takes the helm of the City, high on Young's list of priorities is to focus on using Greensboro's assets to help the city establish a new economic base as it recovers from job losses in the manufacturing industry.

Loose Leaf Collection Program

Picking up leaves can be a chore, but the City's annual Loose Leaf Collection Program, which runs from November 9 through January 22, 2010, makes it easy. All you have to do is rake your leaves to the curb and the City will do the rest.

The program offers two scheduled collection periods as follows:

- Leaves that are curbside by November 9 will be picked up by December 12.
- Leaves that are curbside by December 14 will be picked up by January 22.

It's easy to participate in the program. All you have to do is:

- Rake leaves to the edge of your yard behind the curb. Remember not to rake leaves in the street, because it creates a road hazard.
- Remove rocks, sticks and other debris.
- Do not park vehicles on, in front of, or near leaf piles.

The schedule may change due to inclement weather. Changes will be posted at greensboro-nc.gov and on Channel 13. The City does not collect loose leaves from homes on private streets. For more information, call 373-CITY (2489).

Fischer has more than 20 years of experience working for the City of Greensboro. Before being named Director of Transportation, he held several positions in the City's Transportation Department and also served as a project engineer for the City's Engineering Department.

The Guilford JobLink Career Centers (one in Greensboro and one in High Point) recently achieved Level III chartering status, the highest level of chartering awarded by the state Division of Workforce Development.

Guilford JobLink is a function of the City of Greensboro's Training and Employment Services Division, Executive Department. Chartering standards establish statewide policies of operation that also allow for local flexibility in service delivery. 
OPUS Concert Series



Plastic Bottles Banned from Landfills

Don't waste another day ...

Plastics bottles are now banned from all state landfills. That includes soda, water and detergent bottles, as well as milk jugs. The goal of the ban is to improve recycling efforts, which could lead to improvements in both the environment and economic conditions.





In addition to the ban on plastic bottles, used motor oil filters are also banned from landfills. Motor oil filters should be disposed of at the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Center, located at 2750 Patterson St. For more information, call 373-CITY (2489).

Contact Center Hits 1 Millionth Call

The City's Contact Center reached a major milestone on Monday, October 5, when it received its one millionth call. The call, which was received around 1 pm, came from a resident with a question about the Greensboro Farmers' Curb Market.

In celebration of the milestone, Greensboro Mayor Yvonne Johnson declared October 5-9 as Customer Service Week in Greensboro.

The Contact Center, which was launched in 2004 as a division of the Public Affairs Department, was created to give residents a single number to call -- 373-CITY (2489) -- to request City services and get fast and accurate answers to questions. Its slogan is "City Hall on Call."

The Contact Center's City Services Representatives (CSRs) receive more than 1,000 calls a day on a variety of City-related topics such as water bills, trash collection, road repairs and parking tickets.

The Contact Center is open for calls Monday through Friday from 7 am to 6 pm. Residents may also use the live chat feature to reach a CSR by clicking on the Live Support icon on the lower left side of the City's Web site at greensboro-nc.gov. After hours callers can leave a message and a CSR will respond the next business day.

Greensboro's 'cold cases'

The Greensboro Police Department continues to try to solve old cases, called "cold cases." Each month on its Web page -- greensboro-nc.gov/departments/Police/coldcases -- previously unsolved cases like the one below are randomly highlighted. The police ask for information and assistance in apprehending those responsible for these crimes.
