# Crime stats show decrease in crime

Crime statistics comparing the first half of 2009 with that of 2008 show a 3 percent overall decrease in crimes in the City.

Violent crimes decreased 9 percent in the first half of 2009 compared to the first half of 2008, down from 926 in 2008 to 846 in 2009.

### **Share your thoughts**

There's still time to share your opinions on the City's latest Land Development Ordinance (LDO) draft, which is the source for standards and regulations related to land-use and development in Greensboro. Violent crimes include murder, rape, commercial robbery, individual robbery and aggravated assault. Property crimes, which include burglary, larceny and auto theft, also decreased from 7,593 in 2008 to 7,363 in 2009, a drop of 3 percent.

Double-digit decreases were seen in murder, aggravated assault, auto theft and rape - down 27 percent, 22 percent, 19 percent and 16 percent, respectively - compared to the first half of 2008.

#### **Crime Stoppers receives FBI award**

Greensboro's Crime Stoppers program has won an FBI Director's Community Leadership Award for its efforts in combating crime, terrorism, drugs and violence.

Crime Stoppers is a community-oriented program that uses law enforcement, the community, and the media to fight crime. Since its inception in 1981, calls to Crime Stoppers have recovered more than \$16 million in drugs and property in Guilford County alone. #### GIS technology honored for innovation

The City has been honored with the Special Achievement in Geographical Information Systems (GIS) Award from the Environmental Systems Research Institute for its integration of GIS with the City's Contact Center and Asset/Work Management technologies.

## Police complaint review process outlined

Law enforcement personnel must enforce the law in a fair and impartial manner while protecting the rights of all parties involved. If you feel you have been treated improperly, you may file a complaint to ensure Police Department employees perform their jobs in accordance with department rules and regulations.

Voice a complaint by calling the Police Department at 373-2468 or the Complaint Review Committee of the Human Relations Commission at 373-2038. If you have been assisted by a Police Department employee and you want to praise or commend him or her, call the Office of the Chief of Police at 373-2450.
