Two Electric Charging Stations Available

City Announces Increases to Various Fees and Rates

For the ninth consecutive year, the City is not raising property taxes, but effective July 1, the City increased its water/sewer rates and parking fees. Rate changes include:

- Water and sewer rate increase of 5.5 percent for Greensboro residents and 8 percent for those who live outside of Greensboro.
- Monthly parking rates at City facilities increase \$10 per month and on-street and surface parking increases vary from 25 to 50 cents per hour.

Nugent Appointed Interim Fire Chief

Bobby Nugent, a 36-year veteran of the Greensboro Fire Department, is now serving as interim fire chief. As deputy chief since 2009, Nugent has managed the department's emergency service delivery system consisting of 25 fire stations and more than 500 personnel, as well as assumed the duties of the Fire Chief in his absence.

The City has begun the process to fill the permanent position of fire chief, with a selection expected in late November. Nugent replaced Greg Grayson, who retired in June.



Fire Hydrant Testing Starts October 1

The Greensboro Fire Department's semi-annual fire hydrant testing takes place from October 1 to November 15 to ensure hydrants are operable and able to produce the required water pressure when needed.

Opening hydrants can cause a temporary discoloration of water in nearby homes. The discoloration is not harmful in any way and can be cleared up by running the water for a few minutes.
