ArtsGreensboro/City Partner on Winning Grant for Music Series

Greensboro is one of 15 American towns and cities to win a Levitt AMP Grant of \$25,000 to present a series of 10 free concerts this summer. The concerts will be held at Barber Park.

In July 2015, the Levitt Foundation invited nonprofits, and municipalities partnering with a nonprofit, to submit proposals that would reflect the goals of the Levitt AMP awards.

ArtsGreensboro and the City of Greensboro joined forces to apply for the grant, as did 39 other nonprofits and cities. The public voted on the submitted proposals throughout the month of November, selecting their favorite projects online.

GPD Kicks Off Relationship-Building Campaign

The Greensboro Police Department (GPD) has kicked off a 12-month campaign called "Building Bridges," which is designed to highlight ways members of GPD and the community can connect with each other.

Greensboro Ranks 3rd Among Large NC Cities in Affordability

According to the Budget Department's annual Property Tax and User Fee Report, Greensboro ranks third among the five largest cities in NC for homeowner costs when combining county and city property taxes and fees.

New Process Initiated for Outside Agency Funding

In June 2015, City Council adopted a resolution creating a Community Partners Board to review agency funding requests and develop recommendations for the city manager to include in the budget planning process each year by March.

Greensboro's Municipal Equality Index Highest in Carolinas

The City scored an 85 out of 100 possible points in the latest listing of the Human Rights Campaign's Municipal Equality Index (MEI). The score ranks Greensboro first among all other cities in North Carolina and South Carolina.

MEI examines the laws, policies and services of municipalities and rates them on the basis of their inclusivity of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) people who live and work in the city. Among the categories in which the City scored highest were municipal services, law enforcement, and the City's relationship with the LGBT community.

Water Utility Earns State Disaster Preparedness Award

The Water Resources Department is the 2015 recipient of the NC American Water Works Association-

Water Environment Federation's (NC AWWA-WEA) Large Utility Disaster Preparedness Award.

The state-wide recognition is presented to utilities whose advanced disaster preparedness initiatives prepare for and respond to the effects of natural and man-made disasters, and acts of aggression, as well as outline how to recover from and mitigate those effects.

City Reminds Residents About Yard Maintenance

Did you know that under Chapter 17 of the City's Code of Ordinances, nuisance conditions such as overgrown yards are prohibited?

To avoid violating a City code, remember to keep your yard mowed and clear of:



- Grass, vines and/or weeds growing taller than 12 inches
- Piles of brush, tree limbs, yard waste, which can attract rodents and/or snakes
- Overflowing garbage and trash
- Appliances, auto parts, tires, building materials, and furniture or other household items.
