City Government is Triad's Healthiest Employer



Sometimes, an unexpected change in careers brings upon greatness. In Felix Semper's case, it has brought him international artistic success and the attention of celebrities.

Born in Cuba and raised in Spain, Semper is an electrician by trade and was a Greensboro custom home builder when the housing crisis hit in 2008. He had close to \$5 million in property built under his business Semper Homes, and they weren't selling because the banks weren't lending.

"I had very little choice but to go under, which was tough. I had to start all over again. I had to reinvent myself. So I went back to what my passion was, which was art," Semper says.

He had always been creative and artistic. He loved to sketch. So he started teaching himself how to paint. Soon, Semper was selling the paintings and opened a studio in Revolution Mills.

"Everybody was telling me, 'You are crazy. It's cute being an artist. It's romantic, but you are going to be a van Gogh and cut your ear off. It's tough to be an artist.' I said, 'I don't care if I live under a bridge, I am going to be an artist.""
