### Water Quality Preventative Maintenance Program Underway

Local municipalities, including Greensboro, are conducting a routine water quality preventative maintenance program now through the first week of May. The program involves temporarily using chlorine instead of chloramines to disinfect drinking water.

During this time, you may notice temporary taste or odor differences in your tap water. This is a normal part of the transition and it does not impact water quality. Both chlorinated and chloraminated water are safe for drinking, cooking, and other general uses.
