City Council Approves \$543.5 Million Budget

City Council recently approved a \$543.5 million budget for FY 2018-19. The budget maintains the current City property tax rate of 63.25 cents per \$100 property valuation for the ninth consecutive year. The budget fully funds the 2008, 2009 and 2016 bond referenda passed by Greensboro voters. Review the budget at www. greensboro-nc.gov/AdoptedBudget.

The City's homebuyer down payment and closing cost assistance program (DPA) now offers more financial assistance to low- and moderate-income individuals and families and broadens the eligibility requirements and loan terms.

Couple Finds Housing After Tornado

"The dumbest question is the one you don't ask," says Blossom Overby, sitting on a new sectional sofa next to her husband



Robert, pastor of God's Grace Outreach Ministry, 2910 E. Market St. The couple are two of hundreds of east Greensboro residents who were displaced from their homes by the April 15 tornado.

In the aftermath of the storm, the Overbys ironically became part of the 'in need' masses they have personally served for years throughout Greensboro through various ministries. Suddenly, it was their turn to ask for help - food, water, clothing, shelter, the basics needed to live.

A lead from the American Red Cross put the couple in touch with the Greensboro Housing Coalition, both members of the newly formed Storm Recovery Alliance.

The coalition worked with the Overbys to find adequate housing and arranged funding for it.

Inclusion Specialists Help Individuals Enjoy Recreation

The moment Yolanda Towns-Lymas stepped into the Lewis Recreation Center gym, a little girl with pinkstreaked hair called out to her. "Miss Yo-yo!" she yelled, running full speed across the basketball court into Towns-Lymas' arms. "Let's do a puzzle."

Towns-Lymas' is part of a small crew of inclusion specialists who work to ensure that individuals with dis-



abilities or special needs can enjoy all Parks and Recreation offers. It's a free service Adaptive and Inclusive Recreation (AIR) offers for children and adults.

She has worked with day camp participants on the autism spectrum, to help them stay engaged with activities and give them space to regroup when camp is overstimulating. And, she has worked with children with ADHD to stay on task in the afterschool program.

Each participant has an action plan of goals they want to achieve, and Towns-Lymas' gives daily progress reports to parents.

From the moment her eyes laid on the Expo marker in kindergarten, Guilford County school teacher Kadrien Wilson knew she wanted to be a teacher.


It sounds funny, but it's true, she says. She always wanted to be called on to write on the whiteboard.
