Greensboro Ranks 2nd Among Large NC Cities in Affordability

homeowner costs when combining county and city property taxes and fees. The ranking comes as part of the City of Greensboro Budget and Evaluation Department's annual comparison of property tax rates and major user fees.

While Greensboro's tax rate of 63.25 cents is the highest of the five respective communities studied, the City's fees are the lowest. Average homeowner's fees, including water and sewer services, cost \$566 annually in Greensboro, 80 percent less than the fees an average Raleigh homeowner pays.

Talking with Real People



One thing that turns people off right away is automated phone systems. Often we want to talk with a human operator, right? The City of Greensboro agrees. Since 2004, the City has operated "City Hall on Call," commonly referred to as the Contact Center.

This division employs 14 City Service Representatives (CSRs), three of whom are bilingual English/ Spanish. Staff work 7 am to 6 pm Mondays through Fridays to find answers to your questions and help with concerns about City services.

In calendar year 2018, CSRs handled requests for services and information via 301,721 phone calls, 2,025 live chats, 12,191 e-mails, 4,921 voice messages, 2,219 GSO Collects app contacts, and 854 customer walk-ins.

That is about 90 telephone contacts per CSR a day.

So why are folks reaching out to the Contact Center? The most popular topics (in order of the most often received) are about:

- ~ Water bill balances and payment information
- ~ Trash and recycling collection day information
- ~ Bulk trash guidelines
- ~ Police issues.

So, next time you have a question about City services, call 336-373-CITY (2489). The Contact Center has answered more than 1.5 million calls and is ready to handle yours.

Finding Work as a Newcomer

A library customer from Nigeria had been pursuing employment for several months without much luck. The barriers she faced were limited English, lack of computer skills and minimal understanding of job search etiquette.

Library information services staff helped her complete several online job applications and encouraged her to improve her computer skills in library classes. Her confidence level soared as she became computer literate and this led her to apply to more online job offerings.

"Several weeks ago that customer returned to tell me that she had found a job with a regional grocery retailer. She was so excited and grateful," says Library Career Counselor Valerie Coll. "It was very rewarding to see her hard work pay off after seeing her job search struggles first hand."

With job fairs, career workshops, resume assistance, online resources, one-on-one counseling, and computer training the Greensboro Public Library offers job seekers a comprehensive array of support services to help improve the employment picture for our customers.
