All-electric City Buses Hit the Streets



Greensboro Transit Authority recently ushered in a new era of transit technology with North Carolina's first battery-electric rechargeable buses used in active passenger service.

The environmentally friendly 40foot buses are powered by underfloor batteries, capable of providing up to 175-200 miles of sustainable transportation service before recharging is required. The sole emission from the bus is water.

Ongoing Water/Sewer Rehab Vital to Water Quality

No one wants a trench dug into a street in their neighborhood. But, since the City's sewer and water systems are about 100 years old, many pipes need to be upgraded.

That's why for several years, the City has conducted a Water and Sewer Rehabilitation Program funded by your water and sewer rates. Repairing deteriorating pipes:

- Reduces water main breaks, which can interrupt your service
- Prevents rainwater from entering sewer pipes, which can cause sanitary sewer overflows.

Yes, the ongoing rehab program may require construction work on streets you use daily, like the recent sewer rehab project in College Hill. It could also involve running temporary water lines above ground across driveways and streets in your neighborhood.



"Having quality water services is something we all take for granted," says James Keith, president of the College Hill Neighborhood Association. "College Hill's recent work with Water Resources demonstrated the need for good, clear communication with our City officials, who were making sure our infrastructure and basic needs were adequately met."

"This process takes time and will cause inconveniences, but we're all tough enough to get through it," he adds.

Generally, rehab work involves inserting new liners or new pipes into existing pipes. This is more cost effective than digging up old pipes and replacing them, and it minimizes damage to city streets.

Long-term advantages to the City's rehab program are stronger water flow in homes and businesses and cleaner water in our streams, rivers and lakes.

The City's Water Resources Department has implemented several plans to better communicate with residents about these projects. The main source of information is the City's website.

- Lists of current rehab projects
- Details about how rehab projects will affect you
- An outline of when, how and by whom you will be notified about projects in your immediate area
- Phone numbers for who to call for more information about a project
- Information about rehab methods the City and its contractors use.

You can also sign up to receive automatic e-mail notifications about when a rehab job closes an intersection, road or lane in Greensboro, and a variety of other topics.

"Deferred maintenance can cause unsafe water and national headlines," says Keith. "Greensboro is better than that. Water Resources has a huge job to tackle, but the final product is evidence of their commitment to bringing the best to the citizens of Greensboro."
