### Adopted FY 2020-21 Budget Now Online

The City's adopted budget for FY 2020-21



will soon be online at www. greensboro-nc.gov/Budget. City Council approved the \$602 million budget at its June 16 meeting. The budget maintains the property tax rate of 66.25 cents per \$100 property evaluation. Water and sewer fees remain the same, and there are no significant fee changes.

# City Services/Facilities Beginning to Return to Normal

The City has returned to its regular residential yard waste collection schedule, but still asks you to limit yard waste to a total of 10 bags, bundles or cans.

Yard waste fees at the White Street Landfill have also returned to normal, as have its hours of operation. For more info, visit www.greensboro-nc.gov/ WhiteStreetLandfill.



Regional parks (Barber, Country, Hester and Keeley) and gardens are now operating at normal seasonal hours. City lakes have also resumed normal six days per week operations and are also following seasonal hours. At Greensboro Public Libraries you may now enter branches to get materials, check them out and then leave. There is no seating or public computer use, nor are there any in-

house programs or public meeting room use as of the end of June.

### Are you contributing to Sanitary Sewer Overflows?

During the past few months, the City has experienced an increase in sanitary sewer overflows. To keep sewer lines free from clogs and the waterways clean, Water Resources Department staff ask you to flush only toilet paper and human waste



down toilets. Even if a product's packaging claims the item is flushable,

#### City Installs Solar-powered Car Charging Stations

The City now has two new solar-powered electrical vehicle charging stations, located at the City-owned Federal Place/Washington Street metered parking lot. The stations, free to use during a pilot test period, are independent of the electrical grid. They are capable of storing enough solar energy to charge up to 225 miles of electric

vehicle driving per day.


