New City Map Shows Daily Census Responses



How is your neighborhood doing in its response to the US Census 2020? Find out by using the interactive map at www.greensboronc.gov/CensusResponses, which is updated daily with response rates from the federal census bureau.

Not sure what census tract you live in? Type your address in the top left "Find address of place" field of the map. To see what your tract's response rate is, click on the first icon at the top right corner of the map – the "Legend." The higher the number, the higher the participation has been in that tract.

According to the US Census 2020 website, data will continue to be collected until September 30. Census workers are now hitting the streets visiting those who have yet to respond to see if they can help residents do so.

The City has earned LEED Silver certification from the US Green Building Council (USGBC) for its sustainability efforts. LEED, which stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, is the world's most widely used green building rating system and promotes strategies to reduce environmental harm, enhance human health and support economic development.

Library Eliminates Late Fines

The Greensboro
Public Library has
eliminated charging
fines for overdue
books and materials,
and has forgiven all
outstanding fines.
This move is not



unique to Greensboro as library systems across the country are adopting the policy.

The change also means that Greensboro Public Library customers will no longer be excluded from using computers due to outstanding fines. However, customers are still responsible for lost or damaged materials.

Peeler Community Park Project Receives Grant

Greensboro Parks and Recreation has won a \$600,000 grant from the National Park Service's Outdoor Legacy Partnership Program to revitalize Peeler Community Park,

1300 Sykes Ave. Funding will allow for Phase 2 and Phase 3 and overall completion of the Peeler Community Park Master Plan approved in 2018. Greensboro was the only NC parks department awarded a grant.

GTN Receives National Awards

Greensboro Television Network (GTN), the City's government cable channel, recently received three national 2020 Telly Awards. The awards recognize excellence in broadcast production. GTN has won 24 Tellys since 2000.

Carlos Castellanos won two bronze awards: for work on Historic Hillside's renovation and for a program about the City's public information process. Josh Johnson received a silver Telly Award for his production of Inside Discovery: Science Center.
