Applications Being Accepted for ERAP Rent/Utility Assistance

Has your household been financially affected by COVID-19? Need help paying the rent and/or utilities? If so,



funds the City has received -- nearly \$9 million from the Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) -- could help.

Qualified households renting within Greensboro city limits may now apply for up to 12 months combined (past due plus currently due plus future) emergency rent and/ or utility payment assistance per household. Assistance goes directly to landlords and utility companies, and does not have to be repaid.

Tenants/renters may apply for assistance or landlords may apply on their behalf. US citizenship is not required for applying.

City's New Electric Scooter and Bike Fleet Now in Operation

Blue Duck, a micromobility company, is now operating a shared program in Greensboro. The company offers for rent dockless electric scooters and electric bikes, serving students, residents and visitors in downtown.

Micromobility vehicles are permitted to operate the same as bicycles, following state regulations for public roads. All devices are equipped with GPS technology that allows Blue Duck to restrict riding or parking in areas where they aren't permitted.

Riders may download the Blue Duck app from Apple's App or Google Play stores to locate and unlock devices near them. Riders must complete an online safety tutorial before their first ride.

To Fertilize or Not to Fertilize?

Fertilizers can be hazardous to the health of your yard and the environment when misused. When

over-applied or applied incorrectly, they can run off yards into waterways polluting drinking water,



creating algal blooms, and destroying aquatic habitats.

The decision to fertilize should be based on the health of your plants, the desired rate of growth, and a soil analysis. A soil analysis tells you the soil pH and amounts of nutrients available for plant growth.

And don't forget to establish a 10-30 foot "no fertilizer, no pesticide" buffer zone along any water's edge.


City Introduces Two New Art Programs

Creative Greensboro has introduced partner initiatives under the name of "Neighborhood Arts" to encourage neighborhood-based arts experiences and creative placemaking as a means for community development.

Neighborhood Arts: Residency Program selects Greensboro artists or nonprofit arts organizations for a contracted six-months visual arts residency culminating in a mural installation in selected neighborhoods. Residencies run from June 1 to November 30.

Selected artists or organizations will receive up to \$22,500 to support related costs on a reimbursement basis, free use of City-owned spaces, and no-cost permitting of the mural installation.

This program will be implemented in three neighborhoods identified



for reinvestment in the Housing GSO plan (www.greensboro-nc. gov/HousingGSO), Dudley Heights, Glenwood, and Kings Forest. The program is funded by the City's US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. Additional support is provided by the Parks and Recreation, Libraries and Museums, and Transportation departments.

The second program, Neighborhood Arts: Mural Program, encourages community organizations, groups of neighbors, and business owners, in partnership with artists, to create murals in their neighborhoods on eligible City-maintained streets and sidewalks. The next deadline to apply to participate is June 1. To apply, visit www. creativegreensboro.com.
