Are Your Water Pipes Made of Lead?

The City needs your help in identifying the location of lead piping for mapping and documentation. Laboratory studies and field investigations have not identified any public lead-based, water service lines in use today. However, water can pick up lead particles from privately-owned lines made of lead.


The service line up to your property boundary is maintained by the City (see graphic). The rest of the service line running into your home or business is private and the property owner's responsibility. Having you identify

what your water line pipes are made of saves the City resources and staff time.

City's Homebuyers Assistance Program Expands

Did you know that the City's Housing and Neighborhood Development Department can help first-time homebuyers purchase a home? The Homebuyer Assistance Program offers down payment and closing cost assistance to residents buying a home within the city limits of Greensboro.

- Households with incomes at or below 80 percent of the area median income (AMI) could receive up to \$15,000 in assistance.
- Households that include a Public Service Hero with an AMI of 81-120 percent AMI could receive up to \$15,000.
- Other households with an AMI of 81-120 percent could receive up to \$10,000 of assistance. This is part of the #100Homes project.

Regardless of the AMI, there is also a bonus of between \$5,000-10,000 if the home purchased is located in a designated reinvestment or

redevelopment area.

Winter Shelter Options Available

The City and its community partners operate four winter emergency shelters, the most commonly known is the Interactive Resource Center's (IRC) overnight White Flag Warming Center.

Located at 407 E. Washington St., IRC allows guests to shelter in place around the clock, with intake beginning at 7 pm on nights when the actual temperature, or "feels like" temperature, is 25 degrees for two or more hours. That is called a White Flag night.

This is the second winter the Regency Inn at 2701 N. O'Henry Blvd. is being used as a winter shelter location. The former motel is slated to be developed into the City's first permanent supportive housing facility and in the interim

Safe Parking area at Pomona Park on Clifton Road.

The Doorway Project is an innovative interim housing model adopted by large US cities. Greensboro is the first municipality in NC to use this type of housing, which consists of 30 self-sustaining units with bedding for 58 people. Learn more at www.greensboro-nc.gov/DoorwayProject.

The Safe Parking facility is adjacent to Doorway and consists of 35 spaces for those who live in their vehicles to spend the night in a safe environment.

Referrals for stays at these shelters – except the Safe Parking area – come from homeless service providers throughout the city. Use of the parking area does not require a referral.

Loose Leaf Collection Schedule Extended

The City's loose leaf collection has been extended. The second round of pickup, which required leaves to be curbside by January 16, will now go through Friday, February 10.

This year, a large number of leaves fell within the first few weeks of the season, slowing the collection. The City has picked up more than 7,600 tons of leaves so far – 2,800 more tons than were collected last year at this time. Wet weather and staffing issues have also slowed the program's progress.

Want to Give Composting and Water Conservation a Try?

Did you know that nearly 25 percent of what goes into a landfill is food waste? Or that a home rain barrel can capture water for even the largest gardens, which keeps rain runoff from overwhelming stormwater systems? To support home composting and water conservation efforts, the City is selling rain barrels and compost bins from March 1 to April 21 at www.greensboro-nc.gov/BinBarrelSale. Pickup is May 6; details will be provided at time of purchase.
