Applications Accepted for Lowincome Homeowners Assistance Program



Qualified households who paid a higher City home property tax in 2022 following Guilford County's property revaluation than

they paid in 2021 may qualify to receive a check for the difference.

The minimum amount of assistance available is \$50. Deadline to apply is June 15. Visit <u>www.greensboro-nc.gov/PropertyTax</u> to access the link to an online application system. This system allows you to select from dozens of languages.

To qualify, the total annual gross income for 2022 for a one-person household must be less than or equal to \$41,000. For two or more people in a household, the total annual gross income for 2022 must be less than or equal to \$47,000.



Police Chief's 500 Jobs Initiative Underway

GuilfordWorks is overseeing the Police

Chief's 500 Jobs: Summer Jobs initiative for the City. Launched in 2021 by former Greensboro Police Chief Brian James, this year's initiative is being managed by GuilfordWorks and facilitated through the NCWorks NextGen program.

The current push is to provide 500 young adults, ages 16-24,

The last two divisions of the City's recently formed Office of Community Safety (OCS) are now in place. Mary Houser has been hired as case coordinator for the Law Enforcement Assistant Diversion (LEAD) team and Arthur Durham has been placed in the role

of violence prevention

coordinator.

Both Houser and Durham are in the process of developing their respective team's program. LEAD and Violence Prevention join the Greensboro Criminal Justice Advisory Commission (GCJAC) and Behavioral Health Response Team (BHRT) as the four divisions of OCS, which was created in September 2022. Economic Development News Rules in April

In the last two weeks of April, the City made two significant economic development announcements affecting the Piedmont Triad International Airport Megasite area.

The first one involves TAT Piedmont Aviation, an aviation maintenance, repair, and overhaul company, which plans to expand its operations near PTI and create 85 new jobs. While salaries will vary by job role, the company's plans are expected to add an estimated \$4.3 million into the region's economy every

The second announcement involves Marshall Aerospace, one of the world's largest independent aerospace and defense companies, which plans to establish a new aircraft maintenance and engineering facility at PTI. The company plans to invest \$50 million in the new facility and create 240 jobs in the Triad.

Engineering and Inspections Department Appoints Two Deputy Directors

The City's Engineering and Inspections Department has appointed two of its staffers as deputy department directors, effective immediately.

Jason Geary, manager of the department's engineering division, is now deputy director of city engineering. His main focus will be on the implementation of vertical and horizontal capital construction projects throughout the city.

Michael Lewis, manager of the development services division, is now deputy director of development services. With the City for more

than 20 years, his main focus will be on the economic development of Greensboro through coordination with other City departments

and administration of the review and inspections functions of the department.
