Community Connection in Ole Asheboro

The mission of the Community Connections program is to improve the lives of Greensboro residents by transforming our community one neighborhood at a time.














Goal C – People choose to live in Greensboro because every neighborhood is safe and has convenient access to first-rate schools, services, shopping, parks, and community facilities.

USDA Awards \$825,000 Grant for Tree Canopy Study

The Office of Sustainability & Resilience (OSR) was recently awarded an Urban and Community Forestry grant of \$825,000 by the USDA Forest Service. The "Keeping the Green in Greensboro" project is expected to result in a more climate change resistant community, help reduce air pollution and urban heat island effect, and provide aid to disadvantaged neighborhoods. OSR will carry out the project in collaboration with Planning, Parks & Recreation, and other City departments, and will partner with Greensboro Beautiful, Inc., Piedmont Land Conservancy, and other community stakeholders.


OSR will use the funds to conduct an updated tree canopy audit, working with disadvantaged communities of Greensboro to expand urban tree canopy, and engaging residents in urban forestry planning and management. The project will include education and outreach campaigns, and workforce development opportunities. In addition to advancing GSO2040, this project will help to implement a goal from the Strategic Energy Plan, calling for no net loss of tree canopy.

Watershed Planning

The City of Greensboro Stormwater Division is conducting Watershed Master Planning efforts in South Buffalo Creek, North Buffalo Creek, and Horsepen Creek. These watershed plans will evaluate historical flooding records and develop new comprehensive models of both the streams and the pipe systems in each watershed to identify where flooding may occur.

Areas that are identified as deficient or flood prone will be strategically prioritized for capital improvement projects over the next 10 to 15 years. Projects will be prioritized based on criteria such as public safety, road flooding, and property damage, as well as the cost-effectiveness and feasibility of engineering solutions.

The watershed master planning effort began in the Fall of 2021 and results should be available by Spring 2024. Projects will be funded through the Stormwater Enterprise Fund.

Doorway Project

The Housing and Neighborhood Development Department deployed Greensboro's Doorway Project shelters for use again this winter. This is the second cold weather season for the Doorway Project, financed by the City of Greensboro with contracted onsite services such as case management administered by the Interactive Resource Center (IRC).

The 30 buildings with 56 beds and electricity are now available for people experiencing homelessness. A shared bathroom unit complete with two showers (one with a ramp) is provided. Overnight lighting at the park and round-the-clock security coverage are also provided.

According to a 2022 study by the National Coalition for the Homeless, there's a profound need across the country for a wide range of models and environments to provide meaningful interim housing options for people.

Strategy 3 – Ensure that supportive and transitional housing are included in the housing mix.





East Greensboro Greenway Feasibility Study

The proposed East Greensboro Greenway is a four- to five-mile corridor with two spurs connecting the downtown with recreational and cultural destinations in East Greensboro. The western terminus of the main corridor is the J. Douglas Galyon Depot multi-modal transportation center with connection to the Downtown Greenway and the southeastern terminus is Barber Park. The two spurs will provide additional connectivity to Bennett College for Women and the Historic Magnolia House as well as the planned Windsor-Chavis-Nocho Community Complex.

The purpose of a feasibility study is to develop a vision for future bicycle and pedestrian connectivity in the study area, and identify opportunities, constraints, and recommendations for future implementation. It will develop and analyze conceptual routes and identify a preliminary preferred route. It will also provide cost estimates and an implementation plan for future trail construction. In 2024 and beyond, more detailed design and eventually construction will be completed as funding becomes available.
