Police Information at Your Fingertips

Interactive website now includes information about outstanding charges.

The Greensboro Police Department's "P2C" website has become a popular tool for those who appreciate the convenience of gathering police information online. In minutes, visitors to the site can conduct simple searches, download reports, and report non-emergency incidents online. Now, the site offers yet another interactive tool -the ability to determine if a person is wanted on outstanding charges.

P2C -- an acronym for Police to Citizen -- has been online in Greensboro since 2005. A technological leap in customer service, P2C helps residents save time and effort when seeking information about incident reports.



With the addition of information

about oustanding warrants, Chief Tim Bellamy says the website has become an even more effective tool to help fight crime. "By using P2C to find information about outstanding charges, Greensboro residents can more effectively participate in keeping the community safe," he said.

The article on Monday, February 18, included information about a man who was wanted on 40 counts of forgery and another wanted on identity theft charges. Two days later, police announced the

arrests of both men. Police also learned that a third "most wanted" man featured in the article was already in jail in Maury, NC, after being convicted of drug charges.
