The Greensboro Department of Transportation is gearing up for HEAT - a new Higher Education Area Transit service coming in August for six area colleges and universities. As part of the project, college students are invited to "Bring the HEAT" in a <u>bus design contest</u>.

Sycamore trees in Festival Park that are dead or dying are being removed since they pose a danger to pedestrian traffic. Additional trees in Festival Park that have outgrown their planter space may be removed this summer. Replacement trees will be planted this fall.

The City has awarded a contract for transport and disposal of waste from the new transfer station to Republic Services, LLC. The contract will begin in FY 2006-07 and the disposal site is located in Montgomery County, North Carolina. The first year disposal price of the five year contract is \$19.76 per ton.

Yard Waste Collection Reminders

If you're spending this spring working in the yard, don't put yard waste in your brown or green roll-out cans. Remember to:

Can It

Use your own metal or plastic trash can, no larger than 32 gallons. Filled cans should weigh no more than 50 pounds. If you were to place a lid on the can, all materials should be contained inside.



Bag It

Use only heavy duty clear plastic bags. Using black plastic bags, paper bags, and green recycling bags will result in non-collection. Filled bags must weigh less than 50 pounds.



Bundle It

Tie yard waste in bundles not more than five feet long and no heavier than 50 pounds.
